The 1979 season contains 520 player cards—20 for each of the current 26 major league teams. Each of the four old seasons features 400 cards—25 for every one of the 16 teams of those days.

With the old seasons, you've got four different decades to choose from. Nearly all of the biggest names in baseball during the first half of the twentieth century are included in one card set or another! Just a few are mentioned in these brief highlights:

- 1948: The Indians beat the Red Sox, 8-3, in the American League's first playoff game, after the two clubs had tied for the pennant. The Indians went on to whip the Braves in the World Series. The Cardinals' Stan Musial hit .376 with 39 homers, and other stars that year included Ted Williams, Joe DiMaggio, Ralph Kiner, Bob Feller and Yogi Berra.
- 1938: The Yankees swept the Cubs in the World Series. Jimmie Foxx hit .349 for the Red Sox, with 50 homers and 175 RBI. Some other standouts were Lefty Gomez, Bill Dickey, Mel Ott, Charley Gehring and the Reds' Johnny Vander Meer, who pitched his incredible back-to-back no hitters in June of that year.
- 1927: The Yankees of 1927 are still judged by many to be the finest team in baseball history. They won 110 games and took four straight from the Pirates in the World Series. Babe Ruth hit 60 homers and Lou Gehrig 47 for the Yanks. Al Simmons, Mickey Cochrane and Lefty Grove all starred for the Philadelphia A's, and the National League had numerous Hall-of-Famers, among them Rogers Hornsby, Pie Traynor and Paul Waner.
- 1916: Babe Ruth, a young pitcher then, won 23 games, but his efforts were overshadowed by the Phillies' Grover Cleveland Alexander, who won 33. The Red Sox, with Ruth, trounced the Dodgers in the World Series. Tris Speaker hit .386 and Ty Cobb .371. Among the other well-known names were Shoeless Joe Jackson, Walter Johnson and Casey Stengel.
