Here are the results of the championships: 1953—Browns 20, Lions 14; 1959—Giants 13, Colts 7; 1960—Packers 16, Eagles 14; 1963—Bears 19, Giants 18 (Bears tackled King for a safety with two plays left); 1965—Browns 15, Packers 10 (Groza kicked 5 field goals). Getting back to the 1963 Championship Game, here's how that one went; First play from scrimmage, Wade got injured; did not come back until the start of the second half. Bukich came in to replace Wade. He didn't do too bad, attempted twelve passes and completed four for 117 yards. But of the Weeve passes three of them were intercepted, all by Lynch of the Giants at right halfback position. Two of those interceptions were returned for TD's. It didn't look too good for the Bears being behind 14-0, but both defenses were stingy. Thanks to Chandler of the Giants, the Bears came back to tie it up. Two punts were blocked. The defense didn't score but put the ball deep in the Giants' territory. Bull made a one-yard plunge to make it 14-7, then the Bears blocked another punt from Chandler. This time Ditka caught a 25-yard pass from Bukich to tie it up. That was the last scoring of the first half. In the second half (3rd quarter) LeClerc kicked a 32-yard field goal putting the Bears in the lead for the first time in the game 17 to 14. The Giants came back with a 17-yard field goal and there was no other scoring in the second half lost eight yards, and now the Bears had the ball. The first three downs they couldn't get anywhere, so LeClerc came in and booted a 20-yard field goal. The final score: Bears 20, Giants 17, It went into seven and a half plays of overtime. APBA Football Statistics As Compiled By The Game Owners Themselves

A complete play-off of a full league schedule is easily accomplished with the APBA Pro League Football Game. Many fans do it in a few months, some in a matter of weeks. Here are just a few of the many sets of team standings and league statistics we receive each year from our customers, along with some of their individual game and season highlights:

I have been doing an experiment that you might find interesting. As everyone knows, from 1967-69 the NFL was in four divisions. From 1933-1966 it was in two divisions. I decided to replay the 67-69 seasons with the NFL still in 2 divisions and see what would have happened. The way I worked the schedule was that each team plays 5 of the teams in its own division twice and the other 2 only once, and plays 2 teams from the other division. The teams from its own division that it only plays once are changed each year, just like the teams from the other division. So far I have replayed 1967. The Green Bay Packers won the NFL Championship for the third straight year, but they had a tremendous struggle to do it. The Western Conference was a fantastic 4-way race with the Packers and the Rams eventually tying for first. The Packers started slowly, losing the opener to Baltimore, and then lost again in their fifth game (against San Francisco). Then they got going and finally overtook the Colts, then lost the last game of the season to Detroit to get tied for first by the Rams. In the East, the Cowboys got off to a poor start, but went 9-1 in their last 10 games to sneak by the Browns, who had led the East virtually all the way. The Eagles were a bit of a surprise as they managed to stay in contention until late in the season. Here are the final standings and a few statistics:
