"Cannon-ball" Lawson Little and Craig Wood will be among the longest hitters off the tees when you compile your average-yardage-per-drive statistics.

Paul Runyan, a deadly accurate iron artist, will be about the shortest with his woods off the tees — just as in real life! And Tommy Armour will rival him for iron accuracy on your APBA Golf Course. You will observe the same similarity to real life in the putting performances of these famous golfers, too. Bobby Jones, with his renowned "Calamity Jane," will show himself to be the master putter he was on every green he ever played, seldom missing within twelve feet, and hitting at times from more than 100 feet away. Julius Boros will prove inconsistent as a putter and even Sam Snead, though a superman on the greens, will miss a short one now and then, just as in real life! However, he and Jones, Hogan, Hagen and Nelson will be among your consistently best golfers in a series of several tournaments.

You Must Select Their Clubs

As characteristically, however, as these professionals are made to perform for you, they can be made to play quite poorly, if you do not choose the proper clubs for each of their shots. With the aid of key distance numbers for woods and irons, shown on each golfer's card, you must decide which club is best for each golf shot and you must take into consideration both the flight of the ball and its roll, especially on shots involving hazards such as sand traps, water or trees.

18 of the Country's Toughest Holes

When your APBA pros tee off on any one of APBA's eighteen holes you may be sure that the setting is a realistic one, for these professionals have actually played these same holes many times in their careers.

Every tree, every sand trap, every pond, stream or ocean front is just where it is in real life. The widths of the fairways, the shapes of the greens, the distances from tee to cup in APBA Golf are identical to those of the courses they are made to resemble, for APBA's Golf Course is made up of eighteen of the most challenging and difficult individual golf holes in the United States, as cited by the golf professionals themselves. No two of these holes are from the same course. In full color, showing fairway and rough demarcations, sand traps, bodies of water, trees and greens, they are completely calibrated in black five-yard squares for marking the distances of your shots in any and all directions.

There's the beautiful but treacherous celebrated sixteenth hole at Cypress Point Country Club on the Monterey Peninsula in California. It's APBA's number seventeen, a par three. Flanked by the blue Pacific ocean, it gives you a moderate sized green, trapped on all sides, to shoot at some 220 yards away. With some of the pros you will use a brassie off this tee, with others a spoon or perhaps a two iron, but the decision is up to you.

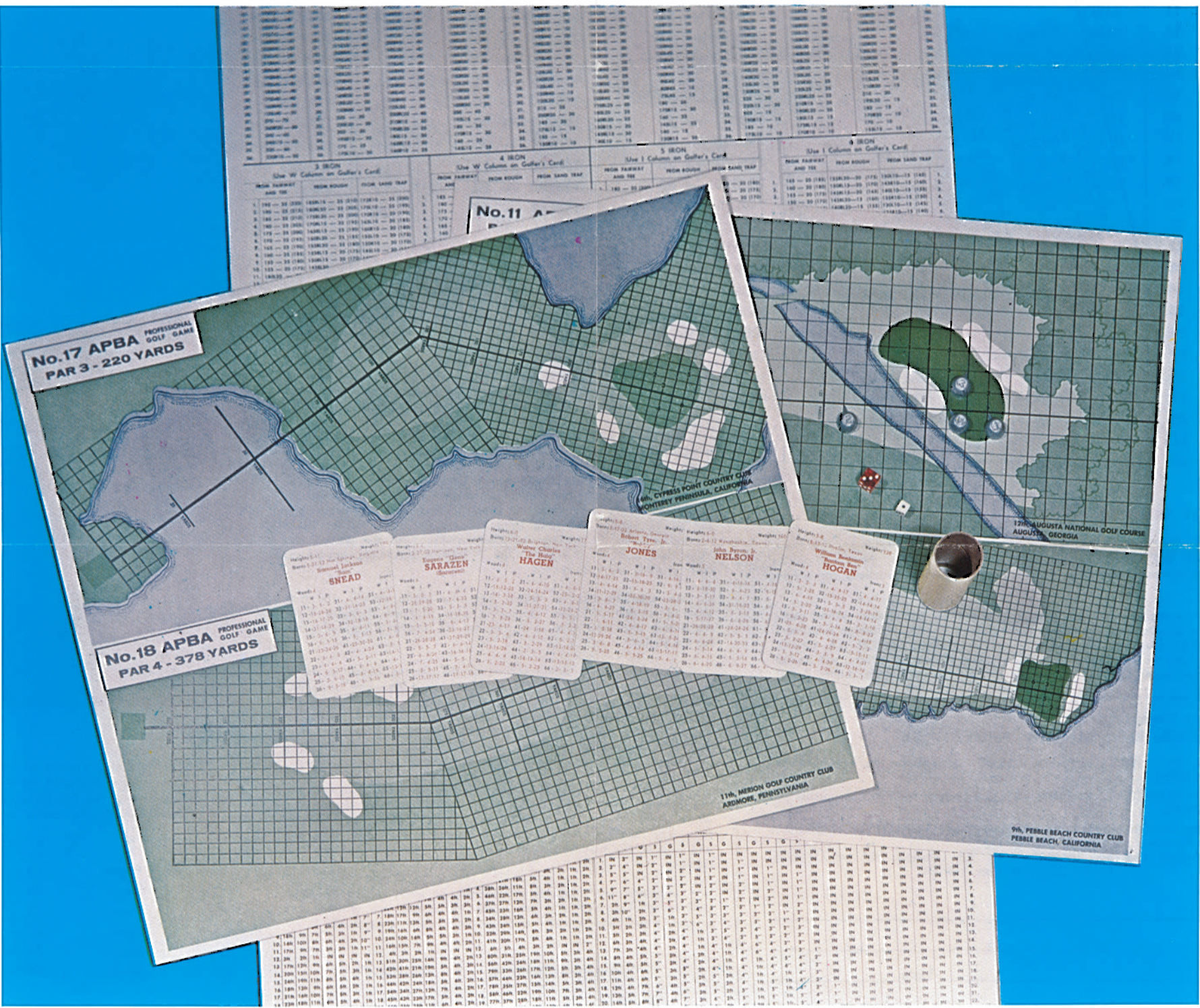
Then there's the 590-yard 14th hole at the Los Angeles Country Club. This par five hole is APBA's number one, and is both long and tricky; it has two large sand traps immediately in front of the green.

Or take APBA's number 11, a 155-yard par three. This is actually the twelfth hole at Augusta National Golf Course in Augusta, Georgia, home of the famed Masters Tournament. Native pines flank the fairway; a wide stream leads up to the green which is trapped front and back.

APBA's number eighteen is the 11th at Merion Country Club in Ardmore, Pa. where Bobby Jones, the greatest of them all, played his last shot in formal competition in 1930 while winning the National Amateur in match play, eight and seven, the fourth and final leg of his historic and unequalled Grand Slam.

Two of these never played as professionals. Bobby Jones and Francis Ouimet never relinquished their amateur standing, but certainly belong in any set of all-time great golfers — Jones, because he is recognized as the greatest golfer who ever lived and Ouimet, because he established himself as the first great American golfer by winning the 1913 U.S. Open and gave the initial impetus to the subsequent dominance of the golf world by U.S. golfers.

HOW IT'S PLAYED

APBA Golf is activated by the famous APBA dice principle, as used in the APBA Baseball, Basketball, Football and Saddle Racing Games — two dice of different size and color, and they are not added, but instead combined — the large red die figure serves as the first digit of a two digit figure and the small white one is the second digit. This makes a total of thirty-six numerical possibilities beginning with eleven and ending with sixty-six, as shown here on the Bobby Jones card. This is an exact replica of the card, thirty-two of which (one representing each golfer) are included with the game.

The three columns of red figures following each black dice number (see the Jones card) give the results of the wood, iron and putter shots and it is through these combinations of red numbers that the thirty-two golfers are made to perform with varying degrees of ability and playing characteristics. In conjunction with the playing board the W column gives the distance and accuracy percentage for all the woods and long irons (Nos. 2, 3 and 4 irons). The I column reflects the golfers individual ability with the wedge and irons Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9. The P column accurately reproduces each golfer's putting record.

An example may be drawn from the photo above. The dice show a number fifty-one. On Jones' card fifty-one shows a 4 for the woods and long irons, a sixteen for the shorter irons and a ten for the putter.

A portion of the Wood section of the playing board is shown here with Jones' card and you can see that if he were using the driver on this particular dice roll, the four would result in a 280 yard drive down the middle of the fairway — 225 yards in the air and a 55-yard roll. A brassie shot from the fairway or tee would give him 250 yards, with the same dice roll. However, the dice are rolled again and again for each succeeding shot.

Note on Jones' card the figure 4 after the word, "Wood" and the figure 5 after "Iron." These are the key numbers for determining which clubs you use for Jones' wood and iron shots. By matching these key numbers with the distance he wants to hit the ball, you will find on the playing board the club most likely to give him that distance.

Truly an Innovation in Table Games

Like its famed contemporaries, the APBA Major League Baseball Game, the APBA Pro Basketball Game, the APBA Pro League Football Game, and the APBA American Saddle Racing Game, APBA Professional Golf is the most novel and realistic reproduction of the professional sport after which it is patterned. It is not the typical table golf game with eighteen repetitious fairways and greens, with pure chance determining the strokes per hole.

Each of the thirty-two pros is different from the others and must play each hole according to the types of hazards confronting his particular skills (in both distance and accuracy) from tee to green. Some of the holes require several experimental rounds before one can successfully determine which clubs to use for certain types of golfers. A long hitter, like Craig Wood, may be able to play over a hazard, while a short hitter, like Jerry Barber, might find it advisable to fall in front of it.

Flight, Direction and Roll —

The golfers don't just hit the ball for a certain lump distance, either. Each shot is broken down into distance of flight and its distance to right or left (if any) and the distance of roll after hitting the ground. And just as in real-life, the shorter the club used, the shorter will be the roll in relation to the overall distance of the shot. When pitching to the green with a 9-iron, the roll may be negligible. With a driver it may be as much as forty yards! No other golf game does this. This is a patented feature found only in the APBA Golf Game.

The golfer's accuracy will be reflected in the percentage of shots that go off center or fall short of the intended mark, and it may differ with different types of clubs. Jim Ferrier, for example, will be far more accurate with his short irons than with his woods and long irons. Bobby Locke, a great putter, will not be as impressive with his irons as he is with that putter.

Fairway, Rough and Trap Shots

The effectiveness of these great pros will be affected also by the lie of the ball, for APBA Professional Golf gives different kinds of results for shots made from the fairway and the rough and sand traps! A shot from the rough or a trap is, of course, more difficult than one from the fairway. This, too, is a completely new feature in golf games.

APBA's full-color golf holes show the fairway and rough just as they are on the same corresponding holes in real-life. Different shades of green clearly show when a ball is in the rough or on the fairway. An off-center shot may not necessarily drop you in the rough when you are playing on a wide fairway, but beware of those narrow-waisted fairways. They may cause you some trouble!

Varying Length of Putts

The professionals putt on APBA's greens with the same proficiency as they do on the pro circuit. Here again the lie of the ball determines the golfer's chances for a one putt when he reaches the green. The distance to the hole from one foot all the way out beyond a hundred feet is taken into account when your pro addresses the ball in preparation to putt in APBA golf. It is important, therefore, that you make a good approach shot to the green with your wedge or iron, for the closer you are to the cup, the better your chances of sinking the putt! The expert putters, of course, have a progressively better chance at any distance from the hole than the less proficient of the putting pros.

Changing Locations of Cups

The location of the cups on APBA's greens does not remain the same. They are moved to different positions each time around the course. The cup may be moved to any one of six different points on each green. This gives an added variety to the nature of each hole, for depending upon the location of the cup, the shot may have to be made differently from the previous time around. This, too is done on all golf courses and is yet another realistic and completely novel feature in golf games. A simple roll of the dice determines which of the six possible points will be the hole location.

Choice of Putting Strategy

Another novel feature of APBA Golf is the option you may exercise on long putts. You may elect to try to sink the putt or to just play for a good position in order to better insure your making the second putt — the very same decision the pros have to make in real-life!

Anyone of these thirty-two professional golfers, which APBA gives you in this exciting game, can have a good round of eighteen holes. Anyone of them can have a good four rounds and win the tournament (72 holes), but over a series of tournaments, touring the pro circuit, the top golfers in real-life will likewise excel in APBA Golf. (If you give them the right club!)

SAMPLE SCORES

Here are two sets of four-round results as played with just six of the golfers. Note that Bobby Jones averaged an incredible seven-under-par per round in the first tournament. Walter Hagen, who was but eleven under par for the entire four rounds in the first tournament, thundered back in the second one to tie Jones and Snead for the lead.
